SCRIPTURE

LUKE 22:66-67 NIV

GOAL OF SMALL GROUP

To help students see that belief is about more than just facts - it's about a relationship with a person. To do this, create meaningful conversation. This guide is a suggestion, not a formula. Adjust the questions and activities as needed, and don't feel like you need to do, or ask, everything you see here.



Last week we said that middle schoolers' brains are growing at high speed during this phase. As a result, middle schoolers are becoming more capable of understanding the perspectives of others for the very first time. This is a pretty helpful skill, but it can also cause a crisis for a middle schooler as they realize, "Hey, my opinion isn't the only opinion. My way of seeing things might be wrong." As they make this realization in other areas of their lives, expect it to carry over into their faith. They'll wonder, "Do I really believe this?" And this isn't a bad thing. Asking hard questions is a necessary part of making their faith their own.
